New Business

CA Climate Change & Sustainability Advisory Committee Presentation

Hans Plugge, member of CA's Climate Change & Sustainability Advisory Committee, presented the committee's efforts in Oakland Mills (ATTACHMENT C).

Old Business

County Executive's Second Budget Hearing

Mr. Edelson shared OMCA's Village Priority Letter for Upcoming FY27 Budget Cycle (ATTACHMENT D). The letter will be presented at the County Executive's Second Budget Hearing on March 3. The Board agreed that changes might need to be made to the letter, depending on the outcome of the Board of Education's upcoming FY27 capital budget vote.

Board Chair Report

Mr. Edelson reported that he had delivered testimony at the February 12th Board of Education (BOE) meeting. The BOE would be voting on the FY27 Capital Budget next Thursday. **Mr. Edelson** also gave an update on Pizzaman's search for a new location.

CCR Report

Ms. Emery reported that the CA board had voted to move forward with allocating the money to study a design plan for converting a pool into a splash pad.

Village Manager Report

Ms. Warren shared her Village Manager's Report (ATTACHMENT E). She said that CA had engaged an architect to redesign the interior of the Talbott Springs Neighborhood Center. The main purpose of the interior design is to improve accessibility.

Ms. Warren reported that she and CA are working together to get quotes for repainting portions of the interior of The Other Barn. She also reported that The Other Barn had hired a new facility assistant.

Mr. Fried said a property had an unapproved addition to the exterior.

Education

Mr. Edelson reported that both OMHS basketball teams were in the championship games.

Housing and Open Space

Mr. McCormack reported that progress on both committees had slowed down due to health concerns.

Opening of Meeting

- **Mr. Fried** motioned to approve the January 27, 2026 OMCA Board Meeting minutes (ATTACHMENT A). **Mr. McCormack** seconded, and the motion passed (4-0-0).
- **Mr. Fried** motioned to approve the February 10, 2026 Board Meeting agenda (ATTACHMENT B). **Mr. McCormack** seconded, and the motion passed (4-0-0).

Resident Remarks

Resident Alex Hekimian spoke about CA's proposed funding to design the conversion of a CA pool to a splash pad. Resident and Howard County District 2 councilmember candidate Arinze Ifekauche also spoke about the splash pad issue, as well as OMHS renovations and the HCPSS capital budget.

New Business

CA Presentation on OM Cluster Play Areas

CA Capital Improvements Program Manager Jason Heath presented proposed play area changes for OM12 (Camelback Lane), OM13 (Gatsby Green), and OM 14 (Offshore Green) (ATTACHMENT C). The proposal included a sensory dome for OM12, a sway bench for OM13 (current environmental and safety regulations prohibit building a new play area), and upgraded equipment for an expanded age range of 2–12-year-olds at OM14. The next step is a 30-day public comment period, with follow-up presentation at the March 10 OMCA Board meeting.

Old Business

OMHS Renovations/HCPSS Capital Budget Testimony

Mr. Edelson presented the draft OMHS Renovations/HCPSS Capital Budget testimony (ATTACHMENT D), which he would be presenting at the February 12, 2026 Board of Education meeting. The Board agreed that he could present the testimony.

CA Splash Pad Conversion Letter

The Board discussed the CA Splash Pad Conversion Letter (ATTACHMENT E). **Ms. Emery** read from a letter CA founder James (Jim) Rouse wrote to former CA President/CEO Pat Kennedy in 1993 about pools (ATTACHMENT F). In the letter, Mr. Rouse reiterated that pools were intended for neighborhood community use and that decisions about them should not be made by market analysis but by the neighborhood itself. **Ms. Warren** would send the splash pad letter to the Board for review. **Mr. McCormack** asked that Mr. Rouse's letter be attached to the splash pad letter.

Board Chair Report

Mr. Edelson discussed snow removal after the snow/ice storm in January. At the time of the Board meeting, snowplow piles still had not been removed from crosswalks near schools, and there were other issues with snowplow piles still encroaching on lanes and merges. The Board discussed ways neighbors could help each other clear their walkways and driveways after storms. Ideas included establishing a use-at-your-own-risk forum for neighbors to communicate needs and bringing back street captains.

CCR Report

Ms. Emery reported that CA would be voting on the budget at its February 12 board meeting. The next New Town Task Force meeting would be on February 17.

Village Manager Report

Ms. Warren shared the Village Funding Letter (ATTACHMENT G). The numbers for the allocation had not yet been changed in the CA draft budget after the villages submitted their request. **Ms. Warren** said an increase was needed mainly due to exorbitant utility bill charges. The allocation committee was asking for an additional \$300,000 from CA to cover rising utility costs. That amount would be divided equally among the villages. **Mr. Edelson** disagreed with that division, saying villages that had larger facilities should have a larger share. **Ms. Warren** said the equal division had been agreed upon to avoid confusion and compensate for lack of time. The Board discussed other issues with the letter. **Ms. Warren** said she would get back to the Board after the village managers' meeting the next day.

Ms. Warren shared her Village Manager's Report (ATTACHMENT H).

Mr. Edelson adjourned the regular OMCA Board meeting at 9:00 p.m.

CLIMATE CHANGE IMPACTS

Vulnerability Study Identified

- ▶ The village of Oakland Mills contains 74 CA-identified assets, including pools, tot lots, bridges, a village center, a youth and teen center, neighborhood centers, and an ice rink.
- ▶ None of these assets have a high ranking for future flooding.
- ▶ None of these assets have a high risk for extreme temperature.
- ▶ The asset identified as serving a vulnerable population is the Oakland Mills Teen Center, which ranked Not Exposed/Low for flooding risk and low for extreme temperature risk.
- ▶ None of these assets serve an emergency need.

Concerns Expressed by Oakland Mills Board during CCSAC meeting 2019

- ▶ **RESIDENT EDUCATION:** Desire to have presentations on climate related topics as well as ways to engage residents in individual and community-based action
- ▶ **RESIDENT & OPEN SPACE LANDSCAPING:** Desire to understand approaches that CA can install in Open Space to improve sustainability
- ▶ **EV'S:** CA could facilitate the use of renewable energy for residents and increase the availability of EV charging - one public facing charging station (J1772?) behind Other Barn installed by CA
- ▶ **WASTE REDUCTION:** Residents want to understand how best to recycle and compost
- ▶ **TRANSPORTATION OPTIONS:** Residents are looking for improvements to transportation including more bicycle paths and implementing work hubs for telecommuting

In response to these concerns

- ▶ The OMI Green Team has presented seminars for residents including “Nature’s Best Hope” about changing garden practices for sustainability of the planet
- ▶ The local YARDS ALIVE! group has
 - ▶ Held yard tours to demonstrate practical and sustainable gardens for residents
 - ▶ Held annual plant shares for residents to exchange native plants from their own gardens
 - ▶ Planned and installed two cul-de-sacs with native plants
- ▶ OMVA has provided grants for cul de sac plantings preferring natives
- ▶ CA has installed 3 bioretention basins (where?)
- ▶ CA has removed weeds and planted natives at various Weed warrior sites including Patriot Pond Adopt-a-Spot
- ▶ CA Streamwaders conduct periodic water quality sampling activities
- ▶ CA perennial (2x100) and tree (100) giveaways for distribution to residents
- ▶ CA has performed projects in the following Open Space areas that are aligned with climate sensitivity
- ▶
- ▶ OM RAC guidelines, currently being revised, have included many updates to ensure that climate sensitivity is observed.
- ▶ Cooperation with Howard County Office of Community Sustainability

Howard Count Climate Forward Plan

▶ WASTE REDUCTION:

- ▶ The HR staff has worked with Howard County to ensure all village streets have year-round compost collection (the green bin)

▶ OPEN SPACE CLIMATE-BASED IMPROVEMENTS:

- ▶ Miyawaki Forest installed November 2025
- ▶ Learning trail opening Spring 2026

▶ EROSION & FLOODING:

- ▶ HoCo improved stormwater retention structures

▶ TRANSPORTATION:

- ▶ Howard County built bike lanes along Oakland Mills Road and Stevens Forest Road.
- ▶ Howard County is working on designs for the Dobbin Road Pathway system in four phases. This will be a shared use pathway along Dobbin Road from Oakland Mills Road to Snowden River Parkway and add sidewalks from McGaw Road up to Stanford Blvd.

Howard County Climate Forward Plan

- ▶ Howard County has provided grants for the following activities with the OMI Green Team:
 - Development of the cistern/conservation garden
 - Rehabilitation of the peace garden, four rain gardens
 - Installed a new retention basin serving the office drainage garden
 - Installed 60 plus trees in various beds/free standing
 - Encouraging composting and reduction of single-use plastics in the facilities
 - Design for two new retention basins treating parking lot runoff
 - Installed a new miniforest with native trees, shrubs and perennials
 - Distribution of 600 plus native perennials as well as youth programs
 - Planted 2000 plus native perennials
- Chesapeake Bay Trust construction grant for 2 retention basins: finished
- ▶ OMVA provided a grant for a pollinator garden, enhanced using HoCo grants.
- ▶ The OM staff has worked with Howard County to ensure all village streets have year-round compost collection (the green bin)
- ▶ HoCo planted / maintain 50 native trees in village open space along Thunderhill Road (OMHS)

- Provide for voluntary identification of persons/groups who may need additional support during a climate crisis
 - Medical needs of chronically ill, elderly, disabled
 - Emotional support
 - Transport to a resilience center
- Consider a “reach out” approach in neighborhoods, HOAs
 - Block Captains
 - Delivery points for foods/water
 - Pathway clearing during major snow events

How Villages Can Help Provide a More Sustainable Environment

- Advertise Resources and CA Sustainability Initiatives
- Encourage residents to take advantage of local, state, federal rebate programs for electric vehicles, heat pumps, home energy efficiency upgrades
- Sponsor workshops for residents on environmental best practices (e.g. solar workshops, raingardens)

Dear County Executive Ball:

Thank you for this opportunity to share priorities for FY27 that the Oakland Mills Community Association (OMCA) hopes to accomplish in partnership with the County. The OMCA Board of Directors has discussed and agreed to the priorities listed below. We welcome the opportunity to discuss the priorities with you, in person, and invite County Executive Ball and/or County staff to attend an Oakland Mills Board of Directors meeting.

PRIORITY LIST - priorities all are short-term and of equal importance, not listed in priority order.

SCHOOLS and EDUCATION

Oakland Mills Middle School and Oakland Mills High School Renovations

Each year we continue to testify in support of timely funding of deferred renovation projects for Oakland Mills Middle and Oakland Mills High School. **We are asking you to continue to include funding of long overdue deferred renovations of OMMS as funding for OMMS must continue through occupancy for the project to be completed on time. As a change in our previous request, we ask that you look carefully at the incomplete methodology for ranking capital needs and the rushed plan B adopted by the Board of Education on November 6, 2025 that removed OMHS from renovations before signing off on the current budget request.** Over \$160 million in deferrals equates to health and safety repairs-including replacing an HVAC system that the school system concluded could no longer support an environment conducive to learning. Furthermore, OMHS is overcrowded and could benefit from the planned addition as classes have been moved to portables effective last school year. We ask that you use your influence to put OMHS back on the HCPSS FY27 renovations list.

This is a serious issue that needs serious attention and commitment of future collaboration between the county and the school system to ensure these long-neglected schools, which serve much higher-than-average populations of students from traditionally underrepresented backgrounds, can provide safe and healthy environments for students and teachers before another decade passes. The request to provide timely funding for deferred renovation projects ensures

that ALL schools meet the same health and safety standards and provide modern amenities to students regardless of their backgrounds.

SAFE and COMPREHENSIVE COMPLETE STREET PROJECT FOR ENTIRE LENGTH OF STEVENS FOREST ROAD

Several years ago, HC DPW approached the community to discuss two streetscape projects. While we are appreciative of the aesthetically enhanced Whiteacre Road, we are concerned that the project did not address the many safety issues that exist on Stevens Forest Road.

Members of the Oakland Mills Board and Public Space committee sent numerous letters, including videos, documenting the unsafe conditions along the entire stretch of Stevens Forest Road. Stevens Forest Road is the main road into Oakland Mills and the only main roadway in the ten villages of Columbia that have residential driveways directly on the road. Most importantly, Stevens Forest Road has four nearby schools that students walk to and from.

We have had several productive meetings with County officials who understand the issues of concern. We appreciate the upgrade of a crosswalk and pedestrian refuge to connect the west side of Stevens Forest Road to the new 7-Eleven in the Village Center. We are also thankful for the other enhancements made along the road to improve traffic and pedestrian safety. **On behalf of the community, we would like to ask for a comprehensive study of Stevens Forest Road, including and from the roundabout at Stevens Forest Rd. and Farewell Road to the intersection of Stevens Forest and Whiteacre Road to determine what other improvements are necessary.**

We would also ask for an intersection upgrade to enhance public safety at Stevens Forest Road and Broken Land Parkway, specifically as had been previously discussed, adding "yield to pedestrian" signage similar to the signs at the South Entrance Rd and Little Patuxent Pkwy. Residents often cross at this location to access the church, the pharmacy, the medical facility, and the other businesses that are located across Broken Land Parkway. An additional safety upgrade request is a crosswalk on the north side of the intersection. There is a section of the median cut out but there is no crosswalk. Pedestrians heading west on the sidewalk along Broken Land Pkwy and headed to the bus stop need to cross there.

BLANDAIR PARK

The popularity of Blandair Park is evidenced by the number of large events held throughout the year along with the great playgrounds and ball fields. However, the Oakland Mills community often feels the burden of the popularity of the park and does not receive all the benefits it could from having this great amenity in our cOMmunity.

As the park continues to grow, parking has become a significant issue, and the Oakland Mills community often feels the brunt of this burden. **We propose capital project funding for an environmentally friendly parking project in the existing Blandair Park. This would include parking that goes up instead of out and utilizes space already paved for parking rather**

than paving over more land. A garage like the parking garage at Roger Carter Community Center could meet such a requirement. We also propose that in the interim, other parking lots in the area that are not being used on weekends, such as the Howard County Courthouse parking garage and the area Park and Ride lots, be utilized for parking to include a shuttle bus to Blandair. This shuttle could be free to those who use it, but the cost could be included in the fee for use of the fields so there would be no additional charge to the County. This would spread the cost and burden of large events to those who participate in and patronize them rather than onto the residents of Oakland Mills who live near the park or are affected by increased runoff caused by impervious surfaces.

Thank you for providing the opportunity to present our priorities and thank you and your team for making our County such a great and “happy” place to live, work, and play.
